## Subject's national or worldwide Context, Objectives & Research lines

The purpose of this specialization is to encourage students to explore Lebanon's valuable archeological heritage. It will form them theoretically to be able to distinguish artifacts coming from diverse historical periods and contexts, all while allowing them to explicitly define the major links between the aforementioned and the present. Not only the Lebanese most remarkable sites will be studied, but also the cultural, architectural, and artistic characteristics which define them. The main

discoveries preserved in the Beirut National Museum and in the regional museums of Baalbek, Beiteddine and Byblos among others, as well as those featured in the international museums, will be included. This highly visual course will be illustrated with images, videos, testimonies and will englobe guided visits. Furthermore, the students will be working on various types of research, in order to establish the cultural context behind every era. This specialization is quite multidisciplinary as it includes not only history but geography, arts, anthropology, human sciences, climatology, zoology, geology among other fields. It allows pursuing a doctorate degree or continue one's career as an on-site archaeologist or conservator.
